About the Bean Foundation

History

Norwin Sherwood Bean was born in Manchester, New Hampshire in 1873 and graduated from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology with a degree in electrical engineering. He served as Treasurer and Chief Executive Officer of Manchester Savings Bank and was a prominent business and civic leader. His charitable activities included the Manchester Community Chest, Family Service Society, the Institute of Arts and Science, and the Currier Gallery.

Elizabeth Nichols Bean was born in Amherst, New Hampshire and was a member of the Amherst Congregational Church throughout her life. She was active in many charitable organizations, including the Amherst Visiting Nurse Association and Amherst Historical Society. The Bean Foundation began operations upon her death in 1967.

Governance

The Bean Foundation is governed by two Senior Trustees who serve fifteen-year terms and three Term Trustees appointed for three-year terms. The Board of Trustees makes the final decision on all grant applications. It also oversees the Foundation's investment portfolio, currently managed by Goldman, Sachs & Co.

2013 Grants

The Norwin S. and Elizabeth N. Bean Foundation awards grants to nonprofit organizations and public agencies working in arts and humanities, education, environment, health, human services, and for public benefit in the communities of Manchester and Amherst, New Hampshire. The Foundation received 50 completed applications requesting a total of \$737,992 and awarded 33 grants totaling \$436,483 in 2013. Four grants benefited the residents of Amherst, fourteen benefited the residents of both Amherst and Manchester, and the remaining twenty awards went to nonprofits whose proposals supported the residents of Manchester. In addition, five education mini-grants were awarded to teachers in Manchester public schools for a total of \$2,430 through the Foundation's Educational Enhancement Fund.

Historically, the Bean Foundation has generally funded the largest number of grants each year in the category of human services. In 2010 and 2011, there were significantly more requests in education than in human services. In 2012, human services outpaced education once again, but in 2013, sixteen proposals were funded in education as opposed to ten in human services. There were two awards in the arts, two in the area of health, and none in the category of the environment. Grants are awarded based on the strength of the applications that are submitted. Trustees would like to be able to present awards in all six grant making categories each year.

A grant to New American Africans to hire a Youth Program Coordinator and a grant to St. Anselm College in support of its "After School Explorations: Discovering and Sharing Cultural *Roots*" at Manchester's three high schools were both directed toward immigrant and refugee children, and several awards supported children of all backgrounds. A grant to City Year funded the City Year program in six Manchester elementary schools and supported planning to take the program into middle schools. Big Brothers Big Sisters received a grant to provide mentors to 65 children who have a parent who is incarcerated. Media Power Youth received support to expand the organization's violence prevention model for middle and high school students in Amherst and Manchester, a program which has the strong support of New Hampshire's Attorney General and Governor. A grant to the MY TURN program gave assistance to students at risk of dropping out of high school, and funding for the Earn and Learn Early Opportunities Program at Granite State Independent Living helped high risk high school students and those who had left school to resume their education with the goal of graduating. Although the award was not large, the Earn and Learn computer-based program was identified by a program coordinator as so effective that it was one of the best investments of grant funds he had ever observed. Bean Foundation support of the UNH STEM Discovery Lab will offer out of school hands-on STEM educational experiences for Manchester area students.

In the human services field, funding of a computer database system for Granite Pathways will allow participants to gain more from their experiences in the program. Support of capital improvements at Opportunity Networks in Amherst made it possible for the organization to be ready for a building makeover as the 2014 signature project of Building on Hope.

Two proposals had particular potential to have broad impact in the communities where they were based. SHARE Outreach in Milford received funding to conduct a survey and evaluation of service needs and service providers in the Souhegan Valley and to use the award to develop a strategic plan for SHARE. With support from several sources, the organization aimed to bring together providers in the region to determine how to fill gaps and address duplication of services in order to streamline the delivery of human services in the area. The second was a proposal from the New Hampshire Center for Public Policy Studies to develop an integrated educational data dashboard for the Manchester school system, assess the data, and present the findings to key community stakeholders. The project had the support of the Manchester Superintendent of Schools and results were being shared with the Health Department as it undertook its Neighborhood Health Improvement Strategy which was funded by Robert Wood Johnson.

The 2013 Annual Meeting of the Norwin S. and Elizabeth N. Bean Foundation was held at the Congregational Church of Amherst. Jackie Marshall and Susan Fischer from the Historical Society of Amherst and Jeff Barraclough from the Manchester Historic Association introduced attendees to the Nichols family of Amherst and the Bean family of Manchester. The two family's business success and community engagement helped to mold the way Norwin Bean and Elizabeth Nichols Bean lived their lives and the choice they made for their estate after they were gone. The Beans were recognized as examples of local individuals whose philanthropy has had a significant impact on the residents of Amherst, Manchester, and the state of New Hampshire.
